



How 2020 compares to other high-turnout presidential elections




As a share of the voting-eligible population





At least 101.9 million voted early nationwide









A state-by-state guide to voting in the age of COVID-19

How easy - or difficult - voting by mail is in each state

- Everyone can vote by mail, and ballots are automatically mailed to voters
- e Everyone can vote by mail, and mail-ballot applications are automatically mailed to voters
- Everyone can vote by mail, but nothing is automatically mailed to voters*
- You can vote by mail only if you have a valid excuse (the pandemic doesn't count)



*Includes states that allow anyone to use the pandemic as an excuse.

Alaska, Florida, Illinois, Kansas, New Mexico and Pennsylvania are mailing applications to at least 10 percent of voters, but not all







When States Begin Processing Mail-In Votes







[2020 turnout is on pace to break century-old records]

In the earliest days of voting, registered Democrats outvoted Republicans roughly three-to-one in battleground states that provide partisan breakdowns. As Election Day neared, however, that gap narrowed.

Cumulative share of ballots cast by registered **Democratic, Republican** and **Independent/other** voters in battleground states

New Voting Technology for 2020

- Apps to check on wait times for early voting and election day voting
- Ability to **check ballot status** as it is sent from election office, received by post office, received by voter, returned by mail, received by post office, received by election office, counted.
- Vote anywhere. Live electronic pollbooks. Ballot printing on demand.
