No formal decision ever been made as to holding or postponing the election

Challenges of Holding Elections in Time of Epidemic

- Endangered health of the people
- Maintaining the legitimacy of the election (low voter turnout, underrepresentation of the marginalized, etc.)
- Guaranteeing the right to vote of affected citizens

Voting right Guaranteed for the Affected Citizens



an early voting station set up at a facility accommodating Covid-19 patients with mild symptoms

Cooperation with Government Agencies

- Ministry of the Interior and Safety
 provided additional manpower for voting procedure, especially for the voting of the affected
- Ministry of Strategy and Finance:
 provided additional budget for safety measures
- Korea Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
 : advised on safeguard measures during voting and counting

Voter Turnout

- Early voting: 26.69%, the highest ever, adopted in 2013
- Total turnout: 66.2%, the highest since 1992
- Most of the hospitalized or the quarantined citizens were able to vote.
